

er - added to adjectives to show 'more of



- 2. If the base word ends in an 'e', just add the 'r'
- 3. If the base word has a short vowel, double the last consonant
- 4. If the base word ends in a 'y', change the 'y' to an 'i', and add 'er'

For example:

1. Just add -er

cold becomes colder

3. If the base word has a short vowel, double the last consonant

hot becomes hotter

2. If the base word ends in an 'e', just add the 'r'

large becomes large<u>r</u>

4. If the base word ends in a 'y', change the 'y' to an 'i', and add 'er'

angry becomes angrier




To make reading and writing quicker, sometimes, two words are joined together to make one word. The missing letters are replaced by an apostrophe. These words are called contractions.

Remember, apostrophes are also used to show possession as well as omission of letters, words or numbers. For example, Jane's hat blew away.




