

Week 5

Today, We are learning to read verbs with the prefix un-.

Now listen to your grown up:

- ·Show the word kind
- Ask your child to act out being kind.
- •Add un- in front of kind to make unkind.
- •Read again.
- *Ask your child to act out doing something unkind
- •Repeat with happy/unhappy, lock/unlock.





Lets play count down!



• Here is how to play:

Display the list of words, one underneath the other.

Explain to the children that the object of this activity is to read as many words as possible before the sand timer or stop clock signals 'Stop'.

Start the timer.

- You can decide how long you would like to give your child start with I minute and see if they can reduce the time.



Reminder

un- is simple to spell using knowledge you learned in Reception and doesn't change the <u>root word</u> that it is being added to.

Eg: unloaded, unwrapped, unscrewed.

The root word is still spelt the same — it just has <u>un</u> at the beginning!

- Say a word and, holding up three fingers, sound-talk it, pointing to a finger at a time for each phoneme.
- 2. Ask the children to do the same and watch to check that they are correct.
- Holding up the three fingers on one hand, write the letters of the word in the phoneme frame,
- Ask the children to write the word in their phoneme frames.

You can use apostrophes to show that you have left out some letters when you are joining words together.

For example, you can join the words 'you' and 'are' together. It would be you're as we lest out the letter a and replaced it with an apostrophe.





- There are three kinds of words:


simple, complex and compound





(yes because both foot and ball are words that make sense on their own)
